
The book, "<u>Scamming 101: How To Scam</u>," can definitely help people of all ages avoid being scammed.

Scribble's Worth Book Reviews – Can Editors Scam You?

- Scams in the editing and freelancing world with Ashleigh Bonner -

Ashleigh, have you ever had experiences related to scams? Have you ever

been scammed in the writing or freelancing world?

No, <u>Scribble's Worth</u>, I haven't been scammed so far. Thank goodness. I had one client who wanted to revise 95% of their book based <u>on</u> <u>my developmental edit</u>, then get the second round of editing for free, but that wasn't my policy.

We resolved this by going back to my policy, which states that the second and third rounds of editing cost the same as the first round.



Can editors scam writers? Or, can scammers pose as editors?

Scammers can definitely pose as editors, yeah.

Some editors or editing companies either don't do the work or don't have the skills to help the author. Some people aren't editors; they're trying to make money. Others charge way higher prices than others, but this isn't a sure sign of a scam because, with freelancing, editors can charge what they want.

Most writers use <u>the-efa.org</u>'s guidelines to see if their potential editor is in the EFA's (Editorial Freelancers Association) range of editing rates. But, these ranges are *guidelines*. While most editors are somewhere close to the range, editors are free to charge what they want for their time, experience, skills, and business needs.

Just watch out for editors whose rates are extremely high or low.



How can you detect a scammer vs. a real editor? To distinguish a real editor from a possible scammer:


1- Look at their portfolio, previous projects, and reviews, especially if these reviews are on freelancing sites (Fiverr, Upwork, etc.) and can't be changed.

(Check Ashleigh's portfolio here, get 10% discount on your order using the code "SCBW10")

2-Get an editing sample before hiring them. Unless you're satisfied with their portfolio and reviews, request an editing sample. Usually, these editing samples are free. Getting an editing sample can help determine if this editor will work well with your book.

(Ask for an editing sample to Ashleigh here.)

3- See if they're part of the EFA or some other association. This method isn't foolproof. You only have to pay a hefty annual fee to join the EFA. I'm not in the



EFA or any other association, but I'm legitimate.

4-Get details. Your potential editor or editing company should provide details (what kind of editing they will do, when will they return your edits). *Beware people who are vague or can't explain what they're offering*.

5- Watch out for editor's websites that have many typos. Having said this, *sometimes freelance* editors don't have the mostprofessional websites; it doesn't mean they're scammers.



6-Raise an eyebrow at someone who says they're qualified to edit all kinds of work. Most editors list genres they either don't want to edit or don't have the skills to edit.

7- Watch out for people who seem like all they want is your money. They want to close the deal super fast. They don't want to give an editing sample. They're "too busy" to answer your questions. They aren't a native or bilingual speaker of your work's language.

8- Remember that just because someone's new to editing doesn't mean they're scamming you. New editors may have lower prices or even offer free services while building their portfolios. Often, they're looking for testimonials to boost their credibility.

9- Set milestones and deadlines. If the editor isn't turning anything in—or their work is of poor quality—don't pay them anymore. Give the editor a trial run and keep the prices low if you're unsure about their legitimacy.

10- Don't pay the full amount upfront. Many editors charge half at the start. Others, like me, ask for a reservation fee and charge per week on longer projects. A few do the work and then get the payment.

11- Lastly, some high-quality editors charge lower prices, especially if they focus on the indie writing community.

Tough question, Ashleigh, were you ever scammed by a writer client? If so, how?

No, I haven't been. When I used to freelance write, I had a client pay after a month. I thought they weren't going to pay, but they did after I hounded them through the freelance platform.

Another tip for freelancers: Keep all messages and payments on freelance platforms.

Thinking about this question further, I *have* been scammed. I scammed myself by charging too little. I was doubtful of my abilities and didn't think I deserved much. So, I worked for low amounts and stressed myself out.

Are you currently available to edit indie books? Where can writers submit? Yes, I'm currently available to edit books, blogs, and website content. Primarily, I focus on books, but I enjoy polishing other kinds of content.

BONUS QUESTION: What are some signs you and an editor won't get along?


You don't like the editor's feedback style. For example, suppose the editor is too blunt. It may not be a good writer-editor relationship



if you want a softer feedback style. <u>I infuse my direct editing feedback</u>

with tons of humor, but you may not enjoy our relationship if you like a gentler editorial style.

I don't believe sugarcoating my feedback will help authors, and I want to help you make your book as good as possible.

look out for my first horror tale which comes out at Halloween in an anthology currently called 'Dread Cold'.

Starting out as an author is, I only now realise, quite fraught with dangers. Not so much 'life and death' threats to your person but rather serious jeopardy to your bank account... As a fresh-faced guy with his first novel picked up by a legit indie publisher, it took only about a day after posting a 'coming soon' social media about the novel to have several unsolicited emails and messages arrive.



Can I just point out straight away that <u>Scribbles Worth are an excellent</u> <u>team_who I've been delighted to get to</u> know. Do keep up the good work! *In entirely unrelated matters* – they gave Complete Darkness the <u>'Comic of the</u> <u>Year Award'</u> which is a huge honour!! So when they asked me to share some thoughts

on scammers out there – I said I was very happy...



Getting Scammed: Buyer Beware / or / was young and didn't know any better...



When I initially got messages from 'Book Promotion' sites and companies, each promising to put my title in front of thousands of eager readers – I was excited. I mean surely *no one* would offer such 'services' if they weren't really going to work right – right?

I immediately tried one which offered to put a review in their newsletter, and promote it across their social media channels – for the 'discount' price of £50. Yeah, it was an absolute scam. Easy (if not very much) money for the Book Promotion scumbags. Their so called 'review' was just the blurb copied from my Amazon listing – *with a couple of added typos for good measure*. The social media posts (I think I saw 3 tweets and one Instagram) were just a low-resolution pic of the cover. It was all a bit embarrassing as I'd worked hard on getting some great artists to create promotion images from the book and in comparison, their posts just looked weak.





The worst thing about the whole experience was that these weak ass posts were like blood in the water and the very next day – I got a response. No, not a huge spike in pre-order numbers but rather a **deluge of very similar 'promotional offers'** – some of them I swear were from the same company using a mildly different name and slightly changed burner email.

What advice would you give to avoid scams? Find some like-minded amigos

Getting into a group with other authors in the same genre is a great idea and allows you to swap feedback and results from the myriad of promotional opportunities out there. You can give each other the heads up on ones to avoid and if you find something that works – share that too.

It's important to mention that there are a host of non-scammer promotors but even they can never 'guarantee' results. A successful campaign depends on many factors, and for some a price drop backed up with a social media campaign can bring in hundreds of sales, whilst another book in different genre might not see any such results.

I've got to know a bunch of great cyberpunk authors and we have become 'pals'. We've put together two anthologies of our stories (<u>Neo</u> <u>Cyberpunk Vol.1</u> & <u>Vol.2</u>) which sell well and I've somehow become the co-host of a cyberpunk podcast (<u>Hosts in the Shell</u>) that in itself is a fun way to help promote not just the genre itself but works by other authors who we get on as guests.



Any specific examples of scammers? Beware the Insta-Spammers

Over the almost 3 years of <u>Complete Darkness being out</u> I have tried to sound out others who have used services and get 'real'



feedback before putting any money down. One guy on Instagram I remember was very persistent asking me every day to pay him £250 to do a review which he'd post to Amazon and Goodreads, and of course his Instagram which would '*guarantee to sell 100 copies of my book*', oh, he also wanted me to add £8.99 to pay for the book too... When I asked him to put me in touch with authors who had used his 'service' as if it did the sales numbers, he was guaranteeing it still only just broke even for me - he suddenly got really rude which was unbelievable.

My advice for what it's worth is to insist on getting feedback from people who have used any service that you are looking to try. If others have found it successful – great! But in so many cases, those I talked to warned me that the return on investment was so pitiful (if any) that they would never use them again.

Is the Comic book world different at all? Picture the love



The comic book / artist world which I've become part of thanks to my novel <u>being turned</u> <u>into a comic</u> seems less fraught.

There is an even stronger sense of artists and writers looking out of each other than in the often-abused hashtag of 'writing community'.

I may have just got incredibly lucky to have found an artist who is super passionate about the book, has reasonable rates and is amenable to the Kickstarter funding mechanic but there are great groups who will advise on good practice, offer up opportunities that they have found worked for them and generally be really supportive.





As Karl and I are working on issue 2 of Complete Darkness we are getting to know so many more established artists out there and are getting opportunities to give talks at events, and even have an art gallery wanting to do an exhibition of the comic.

*Wow, that's amazing! Congratulations. Matt, can you t*ell us about a funny *scam you've seen?*


I got into some funny business

It might not be a major league scam but I do remember trying one site that offered author interviews. It was cheap to 'advertise' so the deal was you got to answer q's and they would run promo ads alongside the interview. Let's just say that their site was one of the worst I've ever experienced. The interview text got mangled so that it made no sense – with lines run together and words missing, and to make matters worse the 'ads' were huge – I mean *whole screen* huge and dropping off the edge so it was basically unusable. All of that I could have let go if it had not been the super over-the-top endorsements that the editor of the site put in. My favourite was "*Nothing on planet earth has prepared you for the reading experience of having complete darkness on your lap*" which doesn't even seem to make sense...



SO what promotion actually works? The good stuff is out there (and offline)

Along with "<u>Scribble's Worth</u>" online - it may sound counter-intuitive these days of onlineeverything but I have found I've generated a great number of sales by having hard copy promotional <u>devices like art cards, pens and sweets.</u>






When I got my first art cards made, I approached events that might attract the sort of readers I'd resonate with such as FrightFest London, ComicCon Scotland, Stars of Time etc who all agreed to distribute the <u>art cards</u> to their delegates in the show's goodie bags.

I also got in touch with the organisers of TitanCon in Belfast who asked if, alongside the card promo, I'd like to do a reading on stage there – what I didn't realise was that the event also had George R.R. Martin reading!?






On the day before I nervously read my first chapter my amazon presales rank was 6,550,000th in the world. The next day I'd jumped 6,549,125 places overnight which was a real boost – I think if it had gone down after my first live reading I may have just given up!?

Final thoughts for Scribble's

I'm very happy to chat to other authors about opportunities and marketing etc. Hey wouldn't it be cool if there was a Scribble's Worth online group where we could chat etc??






William Gensburger on Books, Magazines, and Scams

Welcome to our E-mag Mr. William!! It's a pleasure to finally have you here. For those who haven't had the pleasure to interact with you, or your gripping work, would you please tell us about yourself and your career?



Thank you, Julio. I appreciate the interview opportunity. I'm the multi-award winning bestselling author of '<u>Texas Dead</u>', that is the first mystery in the Mackenzie Michaels series, '<u>Angle of Death</u>', the sequel and '<u>The Extremist</u>,' the finale that is coming out in the near future. I've also written '<u>Distant Rumors: 16 Tales of</u> <u>Life and Death</u>,' which is a critically acclaimed collection



of short stories, and a non-fiction collection of essays titled: '<u>Homo</u> <u>Idiotus'</u>.


Thank you for the kind words. As for scams, I'm old enough to have had much experience with scams. These days I usually get the email scams informing me that I have won millions or inherited millions, which I usually ignore. I can only imagine some poor fool devising the scam only to be thwarted by a lack of solid English, especially when they claim to be from the IRS or some official government agency. I guess there are people who fall for these scams or they would not be so common.

I am always skeptical of any offers, always research it if it interests me—there are enough sites out there that warn you of the scam and often the identical scam has been reported by other people.

Have you ever suffered a scam of some big name of the publishing industry? I have not been a victim of a scam, however in the writing industry and as a publisher I am aware of companies that scam writers. Not all small publishers are bad. But there are vanity publishers that charge fees that are scams. They are called vanity **press because they play on the author's desire to see their name on a** book cover and the hopes of fame.


Ok. Talking about scams, on one of your excellently written books (Angle of Death), of your latest series, you revealled that the villain performed a clever scam throughout book one and we didn't even noticed! It was BRILLIANT! Can you tell readers about the series and each of the books?





<u>'Texas Dead'</u> starts with a body. The lead detective is a feisty woman whose nickname is Maxie. She is fashionable, tough, no nonsense. Her partner is Kobe Jameson, originally from Jamaica, a decent man, soft spoken with impeccable English. **He will not use contractions such as don't and** instead says do not. Together they work the case and meet Devin Parker, a journalist and relative of the victim. No one can figure out why the murder took place. Until Devin becomes a target, and then **Maxie. I won't spoil the rest.**

'Angle of Death' the second book, picks up where the first ended. 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



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The Cyberpunk Queen and her experience with Scams.

So, lets go back in time Anna. Can you walk us through the first time you were scammed in the writing world? How old were you, how did it happen and why did you fall for it?



I don't even know haha. I've been in the creative industry all my professional life and I'm sure I've been scammed a long time ago for the first time, so I can't recall a particular incident.

But I can tell you about one of the worst scams I fell victim to, and that was a publisher that refused to pay me my royalties. That sounds extreme but unfortunately, it happens more often than one would

think, that authors are scammed by publishers.

You told us you were scammed many times. Can you relate other experiences, the starkest ones that you were a victim of?

Another scam I fell victim to, was by an "artist" I hired on Fiverr. Someone recommended him and he had tons of great reviews, so I thought, *why not*. It was the first and the last time I hired someone from Fiverr.

The artwork the guy delivered was good but it turned out that it wasn't his, he had stolen from Deviant Art and sold it as his own. Luckily, my cover designer didn't fall for it and recognized that it was fake. I contacted Fiverr and demanded my money back, sending them proof that I've been scammed. Luckily, they refunded me fully – *they didn't remove him from their platform though.*

This is why I can only recommend keeping away from Fiverr.



Book promo scam sites. Any word on that?

Unfortunately, there are only a couple of book promo sites that are legit and worth the money. Most are scams. I never fell for any of them, but I know authors who did.

I wouldn't recommend using any promo person or company, that contacts you by email, on Twitter or Instagram. You can be almost **100%** sure that *those people are scammers*.

If you want to get any ROI at all, you should stick to the legit promo platforms such as Freebooksy, Book Barbarian and others.

Unfortunately, indie authors have become *a very* lucrative business. People have discovered that many authors are willing to pay quite some sums to achieve book sales. It seems to me that over the last two years the amount of scammers on social media has outright **exploded**.

We know that you are very hard working and focused as a person, and that you take notes. So, allow me to ask this: "What did you learn?". What are the lessons you wish you knew (and the ones you now know) about the workings of the writing world that keep you away from scams? . Are there any tools, places or people that writers, specially newbie writers should be acquainted to so they can prepare and defend themselves from scams?

As mentioned above, I would keep away from Fiverr and the majority of promo platforms. Sometimes those people pretend that they have 100k followers on Twitter or IG, but in most cases those are bots. You'll pay money and receive no ROI.

With publishers, I would recommend staying away from those who want money from you for their services. **NEVER get involved with such publishers**. They don't earn their money by selling books, *they earn their money from authors who desperately wish to get published.*



But even if you're careful and experienced, you might end up with a fraudulent publisher, as happened to me. I think most authors are better off self-publishing than going with a small press publisher.

Ok! Anna, <u>last time you were with us</u>, you mentioned an anthology coming out, and it's out, featuring great Cyberpunk authors, including Matt Adcock! Tell us a little about that please. Where can people acquire it?

Yes! I'm the Editor of <u>the Neo Cyberpunk anthology series</u> and I'm extremely proud of this project. <u>Each book</u> features 15 cyberpunk authors, each contributing one short story. And yes, my friend and very talented <u>author Matt Adcock</u> has been part of the project since day one. I hope there are many more to come.
